## ATLANTIS CITY COUNCIL NEWS

The City Council meeting was held on May 16, 2007 immediately following the LPA meeting at 7:15 pm.

A public hearing was held for Ordinance No. 396—An Ordinance Prohibiting Neon Window Signs in All Zoning Districts. This passed 4-0.

The Council meeting started at 7:23 pm. Council held off on comments from members of the public until later in the meeting so as to accommodate anyone who might want to speak.

Ordinance No. 396, as previously mentioned, passed 4-0 upon second and final reading. The use of neon window signs is strictly prohibited in any area.

Resolution 07-18—A Resolution Authorizing the Mayor to Sign a Consultant Services Authorization for Engineering Services on JFK Drive passed

4-0. This will help correct the bottleneck that can occur when traffic is heavy upon entering JFK Drive.

Resolution No. 07-019—A Resolution in opposition to House Bill #529, passed 4-0. The City opposed House Bill #529 because it takes away local government authority and consumer rights as far as cable franchising is concerned.

In Miscellaneous Business, it was reported that the cameras at the entrances are working and in the process of being fine tuned. Some of the entrance walls along Congress Avenue may need to be adjusted because of the expansion of Congress Avenue. Therefore, any new construction of entrance walls will be put on hold at Club House Blvd. & JFK Drive until the county is 100% clear on their intent.

### **POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS ...**

**Hurricane Season:** Federal, state, and county emergency management officials are emphasizing to all citizens that plan to remain in their homes in the event of a hurricane, to be prepared to be **self-sufficient** for a minimum of five to seven days; this includes water, food, and medical supplies. Federal, state, and local governments have discovered that they are not able to marshal their resources any faster than this. In addition, depending on the severity of the disaster, or the number of disasters requiring emergency response, assistance may not be forthcoming before five to seven days due to an over-taxed emergency response system.

The police department will continue to compile a list of those residents with special needs (medical problems), that will be staying in Atlantis throughout the hurricane season. The department wants to determine what services our residents with special needs may require in the event of a hurricane, and based on those needs may find it necessary to recommend evacuation to individuals that may be at risk if they shelter in place. Please contact Robin Ackerman at 965-1700 to provide us with your information.

I highly recommend that all Atlantis Citizens visit the Red Cross website, [www.redcross.org](http://www.redcross.org), and once there go to the left side of the home page, second button down, and access the "Get Prepared" page. Their "Get Prepared" program provides all the information necessary to plan for any type of natural, or man-made disaster whether in your home, school, work, or community, and now includes flu pandemic information.

## NEIGHBOR TO NEIGHBOR

Chief Mangold's column has some important tips for getting yourself, your family and your home prepared for a hurricane—before, during and after the storm. Here are some ideas to think about to help your neighbors if we're in the path of another hurricane!

Invite someone who lives alone to "weather the storm" with you. If you would like to open your home to another resident, call Robin Ackerman (Support Services Manager at the Police Department) and let her know that you're prepared to be a "host." **Her phone number is 965-1700.**

Are you able to assist someone who needs help shopping? Putting shutters up and taking them down? Let Robin know that, too.

Our police officers and city employees "hunker down" at City Hall during and after a hurricane. Think about offering them "real" food or a hot shower as they're busy getting Atlantis ready before the storm and back in business afterwards.

When the storm is over, clean debris and branches away from the storm drains in your neighborhood, and check with your neighbors to make sure they're OK.

So, neighbor to neighbor...there are things to think about now:


- Let Robin Ackerman know if you are able to assist residents who need help

And if a hurricane does "visit" us:

## 2006 WATER QUALITY REPORT CITY OF ATLANTIS

We are pleased to present to you this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. The City of Atlantis purchases its water from Palm Beach County Utilities, which is treated well water from shallow aquifers.

I'm pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets federal and state requirements.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Steve Mazuk at Atlantis Utilities Department at 965-1744. Our regularly scheduled council meetings are on the third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the Atlantis Municipal Complex.

Atlantis Utilities is responsible to test for Total Coliform, Lead and Copper. Palm Beach County Utilities, the primary supplier, is responsible for Primary and Secondary Standards as required by Federal and State laws. The following tables show the results of monitoring for the period of January 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31, 2006. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It is important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily pose a health risk.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- (A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- (B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

(C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.

(D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

(E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink the EPA prescribes regulations to limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791. These charts are designed to inform you about substances that may be found in your tap water. Therefore, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established standards regulating contaminants. Our utility has never been in violation of the EPA standards.

The charts below show substances that the EPA requires our utility to report, even though we are not in violation of their standard. To determine how we compare to the federal regulation, compare the column that shows the highest level allowed by EPA (MCLs) to the column that shows the level detected at our utility during 2006.

Keep in mind that MCLs are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects for many regulated

substances, a person would have to drink two liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having a health effect.

**\*Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG):** The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

**\*\*Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL):** The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**Action Level (AL):** Concentration of a contaminant that requires treatment

**Treatment Technique (TT):** A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water

**ppb:** parts per billion; one part per billion equals approximately one drop in 10,000 gallons

**ppm:** parts per million; one part per million equals approximately one drop in 10 gallons

**pCi/l:** picocuries per liter; a measure of radiation matter in drinking water

**ND:** not detected; indicates that the substance was not found by laboratory analysis

**MFL:** Million fibers per liter (longer than 10 micrometers

## What do these charts explain?

These tables are designed to inform you about substances that may be found in your tap water. All drinking water, including bottled water, can contain contaminants. Therefore, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established standards regulating contaminants. Our Utility has never been in violation of the EPA standards.

The first table below shows substances that the EPA requires our Utility to report, even though we are not in violation of their standard. To determine how our water compares to the federal regulation, compare the column that shows the level allowed by EPA (MCLs) to the column that shows the highest level detected at our Utility during the year 2004.

Here are several definitions that will help you understand these charts.

## LATEST WATER RESTRICTIONS:

The South Florida Water Management District is the final authority on water restrictions. Stay tuned to local media for updated information.

These measures took effect on May 16, 2007 for Palm Beach County:

- People with odd-numbered addresses can water on Saturday only.
- People with even-numbered addresses can water on Sunday only.

- **No watering allowed on weekdays**

- Properties with 5 acres or less of irrigated area: sprinklers can run from 4 to 8 am on allowed watering days. Hand watering with one hose equipped with an automatic shutoff nozzle is allowed during those hours and from 5-7 pm on the same days.
- Residents can wash cars and boats from 4 to 8 am and 5 to 7 pm on allowed watering days. Washing must be done on or drain into unpaved ground.
- Rinsing streets, driveways and sidewalks is prohibited at all times except when using low-volume pressure-cleaning equipment. Commercial pressure cleaning may occur seven days a week. Non commercial pressure cleaning is limited to Monday through Friday.
- People with private wells and those who draw water from lakes or canals must follow the same rules as everybody else.
- Residents are asked to reduce daily indoor water use voluntarily by 20%, from 50 gallons to 40 gallons per person.

### Exceptions:

- New landscaping can be watered at any time by hand with one hose with an automatic shutoff nozzle.
- Sprinkling of new landscaping is allowed from Monday, Wednesday & Saturday for the first 30 days after planting. Permitted hours: 2 to 8 am for properties with 5 acres or less and 12:01 to 8am for properties with more than five acres.
- Refilling of swimming pools is allowed only to make up for evaporation, or for pools that leak more than an inch a day. Filling of existing pools is allowed after repairs or resurfacing.
- Re-circulating fountains are allowed if they don't leak, overflow or let water blow away.
- Commercial carwashes can operate at any time, but they must use no more than 75 gallons per car or small truck.
