Our hearts go out to former residents Todd and Betsy Hillman, owners of the Flower Patch Florist. You may have seen in the news that their store on Military Trail sustained significant fire damage. This reminds me of a nagging little problem in our community. Many homes do not have numbers on them. This may not seem like a big deal, but should an emergency vehicle, be it the police department or fire department, be looking for your home in the event of an emergency, response time would be delayed if they can’t find the number. Think about it.

Numbers should be 4” tall and be mounted in a conspicuous location on the front of your house. If it is a project you can do yourself, the numbers and hardware are available at Home Depot or Lowes. There are sign makers that will fabricate your numbers on aluminum and mount it to your home. Let’s make this a 2012 community-wide project. It only takes a little time and a little expense to solve this important issue. City News...

The City of Atlantis Council meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. on February 15, 2012.

Ordinance 419, an ordinance adopting the 2010 Florida Building Code with the Palm Beach County Amendments passed 5-0 upon it’s first reading. This updates our Atlantis Code to the new statewide Code. This will apply to new construction only.

Resolution 12-01 also passed 5-0. This resolution authorizes the Mayor to sign an agreement with Zamelli Fireworks for the Annual Spring Fling.

Resolution 12-02 is a resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign an agreement with Xylem Inc. and passed 5-0. The project is for the master lift pump

replacement. Funding for the project will come from grant funds awarded to the city through the EEC Competitive Grant Agreement.

In other business Council discussed Kintz Park upgrades. No election was necessary for the incumbent Council Members; Cathy Higgins, Fred Furtado, and David Kintz as they were unopposed. City Clerk Jude Goudreau has earned her Certified Municipal Clerk Designation, Congratulations Jude.

Former Mayor William Howell was greeted by Council as he was in attendance and visiting from Tennessee.

Crime Prevention Tip: Identity Theft Facts: Fastest Growing Crime Worldwide

Identity Theft Facts

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in the world. Approximately, 11.8 million Americans (one in twenty adults) have been victimized by identity theft as of April 2003, according to research by Star Systems. Credit card numbers, driver's license numbers, social security numbers, date of birth, and other personal identification can net criminals thousands of dollars in a very short period of time. Most often, identity thieves will obtain your personal identification numbers and obtain credit in your name by having credit cards, goods or services delivered to their address or mail drop. Since the bills for charges incurred are sent to the thief's address, not yours, you will be unaware that debt is mounting up in your name until the collections department tracks you down. By then your credit report will already be riddled with late payment histories and show many accounts in collections. As you can imagine the credit reporting bureaus will be reluctant to change negative credit without proof that you didn't create the bad credit.

Types of ID Theft

Identity theft can take many forms. An illegal immigrant may use your social security number (SSN) and date of birth (DOB) for employment purposes or to obtain a birth certificate. Imagine the confusion that can be created when the IRS wants to know why you didn't declare the extra income reported to them caused by someone using your name and social security number. Sometimes personal identification numbers are sold over and over to hundreds of individuals who in turn attempt to obtain bogus credit in your name or establish utility services and run up the bills. Sometimes arrested criminals will use false names, DOBs, and SSNs that belong to another. Innocent persons have discovered that they have criminal records because of a misused ID. See how easy it is for you to explain to family, coworkers or friends that you are mistakenly arrested for an outstanding criminal warrant.

Restoring Stolen Identity

Identity theft can take months and sometimes even years to detect and can take about the same time to correct the damage. According to the California Public Interest Research Group (CALPIRG) and the Privacy Rights Clearing House, victims of identity theft spend an average of 175 hours and \$808 in out-of-pocket costs (not including attorney fees) to fix their wrecked credit problem. Identity theft can significantly traumatize anyone because it is unnerving to know (or not know) the extent of the damage to your name, credit, or reputation. There have been cases reported where it has taken victims years to restore their credit and good name, and had problems being able to cash checks, obtain loans or even rent an apartment

“Open Sky” goes live in Atlantis

With the installation of a cell tower on the roof at JFK Medical Center, a 13-year old project to improve communications between local and state public safety agencies came on stream for Atlantis on December 15. Since 1999, **Police Chief Bob Mangold** has chaired the Municipal Public Safety Communications Consortium (MPSCC), which was formed by the Law Enforcement Planning Council of the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission (whew!).

The goal of the MPSCC was to develop a radio communications system that would allow police officers in all participating municipalities to make direct radio contact with officers in other agencies, rather than only those in their own jurisdiction. It was seen as a project that would change a “walkie talkie” system to one more like a cell phone system with a conference call feature.

Why is that important? According to Chief Mangold, “It’s a much more efficient way to coordinate law enforcement and public safety activity. We don’t live in a vacuum; being able to communicate and coordinate with other agencies during an emergency can be critical in saving lives, including those of our public safety officers. Things would have been better after Hurricane Andrew with a system like this. We’re better prepared for a local, state, or even national emergency.”

How does it work? We use a hand-held device, dial in a specific frequency to reach the agency we want to talk to, and the new cell tower infrastructure does the rest!

What other municipalities or agencies are part of “Open Sky?” Right now, Palm Beach Gardens, Palm Beach, and the School Board Police (partially) are operational. Juno Beach and Jupiter will be online as soon as FCC licensing is completed. We’re talking with North Palm Beach, Tequesta and Palm Beach Shores right now, and we hope to begin discussions with Boynton Beach, Delray and Boca Raton soon. We can also communicate with the PBSO and any other agency on the Palm Beach County system, as well as the Florida Highway Patrol and other state agencies. The technology has certainly widened the scope of our communications potential.

There was a lot of press late last year about whether West Palm Beach would join the program.

What’s the status there? There has been a lot of development in West Palm Beach since the initial requirements of the system were identified in 2000, and their officials are debating whether to invest additional funds to expand the original scope of their coverage. We hope they come on board. Since part of the original concept was to share resources while improving public safety, the more agencies that participate the better.

Is it working well for Atlantis? Yes! The new system has improved our local situation, too. The new technology allows all our officers to be in contact with each other 100% of the time in 100% of the city. There used to be some “dead spots” on our radio system at JFK (Medical Center). That doesn’t happen anymore. Another benefit is that within the City, we have 4 “talk paths” on our radio frequency and our system is divided into three “talk groups:” PD Main, City and Tactical. That means that we can carry on 3 conversations simultaneously without having to listen to each other if we don’t want to. The system is very efficient and I’m thrilled that “Open Sky” is finally here! It’s real! It works!


