Of course, I must regress and ask that you help during the "exceptional" drought we are experiencing. Please be sure that all irrigation systems are properly adjusted and the proper watering times are obeyed. There are still many homes with sprinkler heads watering roadways and driveways. Lawns and landscapes are in need of all possible watering assistance so don't waste any. People who border the golf courses must remember that golf courses are not limited by the day or time irrigation can be applied. They have equipment to measure the amount of water they are using and are regulated by the quantity applied, not the time or day.

Although we have had limited numbers, we continue to be troubled by homes in or near foreclosure. Please believe me, "we share your pain". Government has no easy or quick way of solving these problems. The city will continue to do what it can as soon as possible. We must

however abide by the laws and statutes applicable to each situation. I'm sure most have seen the publications showing that our property values have again declined in Atlantis. This is distressing news since nearly 70% of our revenues are from ad valorem taxes. Everything possible is being looked at to insure we get full value for all tax dollars. The effects of recently enacted legislation by the state and additional county fees are currently being evaluated for local impact. My personal goal is to again keep city finances within the "roll-back" constraints. I believe that staff will contribute to this effort and we can present a budget protecting services while minimizing taxes. I must state that this will be no easy task.

Several residents have contacted me indicating that they would prefer slight tax increases to curtailment of services. Everyone is aware of the problems being encountered by surrounding cities and don't want to be faced with the choices of fewer services and/or less personnel. Thanks to all for your constructive input and concerns. I share your pains and desires for our city.

The City of Atlantis Council Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. on June 15th.

In Miscellaneous Business, by a 5-0 vote; Manny Fernandez, Treasurer, Dennis Kania, CPA, and Richard Gates, CPA, were appointed to the Auditor Selection Committee.

A proclamation declaring June 22nd as "James Titcomb Day" was read by the Mayor. Mr. Titcomb of North Country Club Drive is retiring after 12 years as the Executive Director of the Palm Beach County League of Cities. Mr. Titcomb, a man of many talents, designed our City's Logo. We wish him much continued success as he takes over as the new city manager of North Palm Beach.

Treasurer Manny Fernandez said they may be forced to raise taxes in the future in order to maintain our level of standards.

Community Safety through Community Awareness and Involvement:**Crime Prevention Tip: Family Security and Safety tips.**

Last month information was presented about "Be a Good Neighbor"; this month we are continuing with information about "Shopping Center Security."

Our family is at the center of our personal universe. Most people would do almost anything for the sake of their family. That includes protecting them from known dangers and harm. This becomes increasingly difficult, at times, because we live in an open society where we share the same public places as violent criminals, like at shopping centers.

Family Security Plan

Whenever your family walks out the front door they leave that zone of protection that you have created. The secret to keeping your family reasonably safe once they leave home is to have a family security plan. To develop a family security plan you must give careful thought to the public routines of each family member and think of ways to make them safer from the violent people in the world. The best way to accomplish this is to hold a family meeting to discuss this plan and play *what if* using different scenarios. For example, *what if* we need to go shopping at the mall? What precautions can we take to be safer in the parking lot? *What if* someone approaches to rob us while walking to our car on the street at night? What would we do and how would we react? Where would we go and who would we notify in case of emergency?

Most people have no such family plan and have not met as a family to discuss *what if* situations. When or if a criminal assault does occur, the family will not be prepared and will have to rely on instinct in response to the incident. What if their response instincts are wrong or their reactions inappropriate, under the circumstances?

Shopping Centers

Shopping centers come in all sizes from the giant regional malls to the small strip-center with only a few stores. What they have in common is a parking lot. This is where your family is at greatest risk because of the "nature" of a parking lot. If you think about it, we are all strangers in a large parking lot. Violent criminals can blend in with the rest of us and get in close proximity fairly easily. Criminal predators can walk right by us and we will allow it because of the public setting.

Learn to Observe Conduct

Next time you go to a large shopping center sit in the parking lot for a few minutes and observe how easy it would be for a criminal predator to approach and attack you or your family. Shoppers walk to and from their cars totally consumed by their thoughts and thinking about what they are going to do next. Watch shoppers as they approach their cars fumbling for their keys. They will turn their backs and attention completely away from those nearby to load their shopping bags into the car, and get children and infants installed inside the vehicle. Most shopping center violent crimes occur precisely at this point. The most common violent crimes are purse-snatch and strong-arm robbery. Less common but potentially more serious are the crimes of car-jacking and abduction.

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Awareness is Important

To protect your family in this setting the best defense is awareness. Awareness will allow you anticipate the potential danger and plan ahead for the next time you go to a shopping center. Planning includes selecting a safer time to shop (daylight) and arranging not to shop alone if possible. You can plan where to park (i.e. not next to a large van) and in high traffic areas. You can plan to scan the area for suspicious people before parking and exiting your vehicle. You can also plan not to park or exit your vehicle if suspicious people are in the area. Families should agree in advance to exit and enter their vehicle quickly and lock the doors. Families should be trained to look around their vehicle before approaching and retreat if anyone suspicious is loitering in the area. They should be trained to return to the shopping center and alert security or call the police.

- Be aware and alert to predators in the parking lot
- Plan when to go and where to park
- Do not get out of the car if it doesn't appear safe to do so
- Scan the area around your car as you approach it
- Teach your family to enter and exit the car quickly
- Trust your instincts if you see someone suspicious
- Return to the store if anyone looks or acts suspicious
- Ask if the shopping center does parking lot escorts

HURRICANE PREPARDNESS

Please keep this as a reference June 1-Nov 30, 2011.

Now that the hurricane season is here, it is important to be as prepared as possible. Here are some helpful tips:

- ◆ Put important documents and phone numbers in a waterproof container.
 - ◆ All trees and shrubs should be trimmed by now – do not do any trimming before a hurricane is about to come.
 - ◆ Monitor the tropics: tune into local television and radio stations; heed the advice of local authorities; evacuate if ordered. Do not return until it is safe to do so.
 - ◆ Remove lawn furniture, pots, plants or any other outside items that could be potential projectiles.
 - ◆ If a storm watch has been issued, do not place yard waste, recycling, or garbage at the curb. Please be patient until normal collection resumes.
 - ◆ You can get helpful information regarding power outages, etc. by going online at FPL.com. To report a hazardous condition or power outage, please call 1-800-4OUTAGE (1-800-468-8243).
- Personal hygiene items such as soap, toothpaste and toothbrush, toilet paper, etc.
 - Liquid bleach to treat drinking water
 - Cash – ATM's may not be operating after a storm

If you haven't already prepared a hurricane emergency supply kit, do so now. Remember to include such items as:

- Three gallons of water per person
- Canned & ready-to-eat food, fruits, crackers, etc. and foods that do not require cooking
- Manual can opener
- First aid kit, prescription and non-prescription drugs
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils; foil, plastic wrap & plastic garbage bags

FLOOD HAZARD & PREPARATION INFORMATION**THE LOCAL FLOOD HAZARD**

Every property is at risk of flooding. In fact, there is a 26% chance of experiencing a flood during the life of a 30-year mortgage. Many factors contribute to flooding in areas not designated as Special Flood Hazard Areas. The greatest flood threats come from excessive rainfall that accompanies coastal storms, tropical storms and hurricanes. Finished Construction Elevation Certificates are on file.

The Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) provides flood zone determinations to advise if you are in a flood hazard area. Property within the City of Atlantis is located in several different flood zones. Most properties east of Villa Drive (North and South including Villa Drive) and along Atlantis Blvd. are located in the special flood hazard due to Lake Atlantis and Lake Atlantis South. Properties in Palm Circle adjacent to the C-15 lagoon are in the special flood hazard area. All properties west of Villa Drive are not in a special flood hazard area. You may contact City Hall to find out what flood zone your property is located in.

FLOOD INSURANCE

Homeowner's insurance policies DO NOT cover losses due to flooding. There is a 30-day waiting period. Please note that new flood insurance policies will not be written once a storm is approaching. The City of Atlantis participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, which makes flood insurance available to everyone in the City. For most, a home and its contents are their greatest investment. If your property is even subject to the possibility of flood damage, from hurricanes or otherwise, you should be protected with an NFIP Flood Policy. Contact your insurance agent and have him or her discuss the types of coverage available to you. FLOOD SAFETY

There is no substitute for advance planning and preparation. Be aware of what steps to take to minimize your losses due to flooding. Prepare and annually update an inventory of all personal property with descriptions and photos, store drinking water in clean containers, keep a portable radio and flashlights on hand with fresh batteries, and have adequate first-aid supplies on hand. The local television and radio stations will warn you when it is necessary to secure your property and evacuate. Live electrical lines cause most hazards. If it appears that floodwaters will enter your home, turn off all electric and gas service. If you find that water has entered your home, do not touch electrical switches or appliances to either turn them on or off. Outside, avoid any pools of water in which a downed power line is laying. You must assume that all downed power lines are energized. Do not drive through a flooded area. SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT REQUIREMENTS:

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) requires that, if the cost of the reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, or other improvements to a building equals or exceeds 50% of the building's market value, the entire building must meet the same construction requirements of a new building.

PERMITS

The City of Atlantis Building Department requires permits for all construction. This includes new construction, repair/replacement work, additions, signs, fences, fill, tree removal, etc. The City of Atlantis has adopted the Florida Standard Building Code. Parts of this code regulate the amounts and types of construction in the floodplain. You must always consult with the building official when planning any kind of construction. When others violate our floodplain laws, it could affect your property. The building official should be made aware of such activities.

THE FLOOD WARNING SYSTEM:

The City has a reverse 911 telephone dialing system that will notify of pending storms. In addition, copies of Palm Beach County's Flood Warning Program are available at your nearest county library. Palm Beach County Emergency Management maintains direct contact with the National Weather Service. Local television and radio stations will broadcast hurricane associated flood warnings 36 to 48 hours prior to the flooding event. When the National Weather Service forecast intense rainfall, our drainage system can be lowered in an attempt to receive the extraordinary volume of water expected. During periods of prolonged rainfall, areas of the county are kept under surveillance and reported to the Emergency Operating Center. When advised of problem areas, response actions will be taken. When you detect street flooding in your own area, tune to a television or radio station known by you to have an active news bureau. You will be advised of measures you should take to protect your property and yourself. If you have a weather band radio, tune it to NOAA, weather radio frequency 162.475 MHz to receive local weather updates.

PROPERTY PROTECTION MEASURES

When it appears that your neighborhood is becoming seriously inundated, there are simple things you can do to protect your property: things such as sandbagging building entrances, moving your motor vehicles to higher ground, raising furniture off the floor or moving it to upper floors. Many of the things you own are not only valuable but are considered by you to be irreplaceable. These items should be elevated above the floor level to protect them from flood damage. Store materials like tarps, sandbags, plastic sheeting, plywood, and lumber to protect structures, and to make quick repairs after a severe storm. Board up or shutter windows and doors. DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

The Lake Worth Drainage District maintains the lateral canals in Atlantis. The Public Works Department maintains the remaining swales and storm drains. To reduce the risk, severity or duration of flooding; it is vital to maintain the water-carrying capacity of the drainage system. Florida law prohibits the willful obstruction of our drainage systems and provides both civil and criminal penalties for anyone convicted of such a felony. Anytime you see debris partially or completely blocking a storm drain opening please remove and dispose of the debris or call at the City at 561-965-1744. It is illegal to dump or throw anything into the ditches and canals. If you see anyone disposing of anything, including liquids, trash, vegetation or any other debris into any component of the drainage system, please report it immediately to the Atlantis Police Department at 561-965-1700.

BENEFICIAL FUNCTIONS OF THE FLOODPLAIN:

These benefits take many forms:

Natural flood and erosion control: Provides natural flood and erosion control by flood storage and conveyance, and reducing flood velocity.

Water quality: Improves water quality by filtering nutrients and impurities from runoff.

Ground water recharge: Recharges the ground water while simultaneously reducing the frequency and duration of surface flow.

Biological resources: Supports high rate of plant growth, provides breeding and feeding grounds and enhances water fowl habitat.

Societal resources: Provides open space, aesthetic pleasures for the community and opportunities for scientific and environmental research studies.

NPDES (National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System) REQUIREMENTS:

The City of Atlantis must follow the Federal government's requirements in our NPDES permit. It is everyone's responsibility to protect our water resources. Please do not directly discharge any used water into our watercourses. Simple examples are washing vehicles in close proximity of a storm drain and storing chemicals outdoors. The law prohibits dumping toxic waste, including pesticides, into the ground or groundwater. TOXIC or hazardous wastes include such things as oil and antifreeze. If you see anyone disposing of anything into any component of the drainage system, please report it immediately to the Atlantis Police Department at 561-965-1700.

Outdoor use of pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers must be applied sparingly to avoid contamination of our surface waters. Please follow directions and do not overspray pesticides or herbicides. Also please do not apply amounts in excess of the recommended amounts for fertilizers. Organic or slow release fertilizers are preferred as these are less likely to be washed off into the storm drain system. Also, please apply only to the targeted areas and remove excess from any paved surfaces. South Florida is a sub-tropical rainfall region, so please consider reducing applications in the wet season and/or apply early in the morning to avoid our typical afternoon thunderstorm pattern in the wet season (June through October).

Storm Water

By knowing the facts and being aware, you can help clean up our lakes and waterways. Always remember, **nothing but storm water** belongs in the storm drains.

Pool Care: Discharge of chlorinated pool water into the city's storm drain is prohibited. Pool water must be de-chlorinated and discharged on to the ground, not into the storm drain system. Discharge from pool maintenance, replastering or other construction is strictly prohibited.

- **Lawn Care:**

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts.
- Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or waterways.
- Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used for landscaping projects.

- **House Care and Maintenance:**

- Purchase biodegradable, non-toxic products.
- Use, store and dispose of products as directed on the container.
- Sweep up and properly dispose of any construction debris.

- **Vehicle Care:**

- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface.
- Check your vehicle regularly for leaks and/or spills. Clean up and properly dispose of materials used for spill clean up. Repair leaks as soon as possible to prevent future spills.

- Be on the lookout for anything being dumped into storm drains or water bodies. Some common illegal discharges to storm drains include:
 - Antifreeze
 - Automotive fluids
 - Construction debris (wood, drywall, concrete, mortar)
 - Debris (plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts)
 - Detergents
 - Disinfectants
 - Excessive dirt and gravel
 - Fertilizers
 - Insecticides
 - Grease
 - Oil filters
 - Paint
 - Pesticides
 - Pet waste
 - Solvents/degreasers
 - Trash
 - Yard waste (leaves, grass, mulch)
- Take the time to educate others on the negative impact of dumping into a storm water system.

CITY OF ATLANTIS 2010 WATER QUALITY REPORT

Dear Customers,

We are pleased to present to you this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. The City of Atlantis purchases its water from Palm Beach County Utilities, which is treated well water from shallow aquifers.

I'm pleased to report that our drinking water meets federal and state requirements.

The City of Atlantis routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our water monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2010. The data obtained and presented in this report are from the most recent tests performed in accordance with the established drinking water laws, rules, and regulations.

The City of Atlantis is responsible to test for total Coliform bacteria monthly and Lead and Copper in accordance with 40 CFR 141.Subpart 1. Palm Beach County Utilities System II, the primary supplier, is responsible to monitor for Primary, and Secondary contaminants as required by Federal, and State Laws. This annual report is for the reporting period of January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2010.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

(A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock

operations, and wildlife.

(B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

(C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.

(D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

(E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink the EPA prescribes regulations to limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants

and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

These charts are designed to inform you about substances that may be found in your tap water. Therefore, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established standards regulating contaminants. Our utility has never been in violation of the EPA standards.

The charts below show substances that the EPA requires our utility to report, even though we are not in violation of their standard. To determine how we compare to the federal regulation, compare the column that shows the highest level allowed by EPA (MCLs) to the column that shows the level detected at our utility during 2010.

Keep in mind that MCLs are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects for many regulated substances, a person would have to drink two liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having a health effect.

"If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Atlantis Utilities is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Initial Distribution System Evaluation (IDSE): An important part of the Stage 2 Disinfection Byproducts Rule (DBPR). The IDSE is a one-time study conducted by water systems to identify distribution system locations with high concentrations of trihalomethanes (THMs) and haloacetic acids (HAAs). Water systems will use results from the IDSE, in conjunction with their Stage 1 DBPR compliance monitoring data, to select compliance monitoring locations for the Stage 2 DBPR.

Atlantis receives its water primarily from Palm Beach County Water Utilities System II. They have 14 wells approximately 150 feet underground in the Shallow Aquifer. Palm Beach County operates five water treatment plants. The plants are staffed 24 hours a day by state-licensed water plant operators. The Department is continually upgrading its facilities to utilize the most effective and up-to-date technologies for water treatment, such as state-of-the-art membrane softening, ozonation, lime softening, filtration, and disinfection by chlorination.


